





SOME of the world's leading radiologists are in Adelaide to discuss the benefits of proton therapy to treat people with inoperable cancers.

One person well aware of the advantages is 27-year-old Shona Edwards, of Warradale. who was diagnosed with a tumour at the base of her spine four years ago.

Radiation treatment would have put nearby organs at risk so proton beam therapy was her final option.

With no proton therapy unit available in Australia, Ms Edwards was put on lists at a few overseas centres.
